The AS Level is composed of two modules, which focus on Government and Politics of modern Wales and its context within the UK.

Unit 1: Government in Wales and the UK

Unit 2: Living and participating in a democracy

The A Level is made up of the AS units plus two more units, which are studied at a higher level.

Unit 3: Political concepts and themes

Unit 4: Government and politics of the USA

You'll be assessed via externally set examinations. Students are expected to complete internally set formal assessments throughout the year. Upon completion, you'll achieve:
